DDA

- Agriculture
- Non Agricultural Market Access (NAMA)
- Services
- Trade Facilitation
- Special & Differential Treatment

Agriculture

- Export Competition further
 elaboration of parallel commitments
- Domestic Support structure of reduction commitments
- Market Access needs most work structure of market access formula and flexibilities



NAMA

- Huge economic opportunity
- Increased south south trade ®ional integration
- Disproportionate benefits to Developing Countries

Services

- EU 66% of GDP, employing more than 67 million
- Japan 75% of GDP
- US 75% of GDP and 8 out of 10 jobs
- Developing countries typically more than 50% GDP
- Disappointing level of offers how can this be improved?

Trade Facilitation

- Potential benefits of more than €300 billion per year
- Particularly helps Developing Countries
- Most encouraging area of DDA negotiations
- Must provide support for Developing Countries to meet commitments

Special and Differential Treatment

- More work to be done as negotiations get more detailed
- Need clear commitments across each dossier
- Committed to achieve pro-development outcomes of the Round



Risks

- "Sleepwalking to failure"
- Unbalanced emerging outcome
- Leaving too much to be done at Hong Kong
